Report 2010

2010 has been a busy year in the SBRC. Eight externally funded projects either started or continued in 2010, and 40 research outputs were published by the nine staff. These publications included nine peer-reviewed journal articles, three books, seven book chapters, 14 conference papers, and seven research reports. In addition, David Smallbone and Robert Blackburn were co-chairs of the ISBE Annual Conference in London, in November.

International links

2010 saw a high level of international activity by SBRC staff, in terms of collaborative research, co-authorship of publications and conference participation. We have continued to work with our European partners, and were responsible for the UK section of the EU's Annual SME Report for DG Enterprise and Industry. Most SBRC researchers were involved in at least one major international conference in 2010 (including RENT, ICSB and the International Network of Business and Management Journals (INBAM)). As in previous years, the SBRC has hosted a number of international researchers during the past year, including visitors from Finland, Japan and Spain. In addition, three projects were either sourced internationally, or involved foreign partners. This year, we were also delighted to host Professor Busujima Takakazu from the Chiba University of Commerce, Japan.

Research projects

New research projects undertaken during 2010 included the following:

• A study of small firm survival and growth strategies in post-recessionary conditions. Building upon a 2009 study, this is an investigation of London-based SMEs, involving David Smallbone, John Kitching, Mirela Xheneti and Eva Kasperova. Supported by an ISBE RAKE grant and the Workspace Group PLC, the study is concerned with the implications of the different forms of adaptation undertaken by firms in 2008–09 for their medium- and-longer-term performance prospects.

- The views and responses of British SMEs in the recovery.

 Commissioned by Barclays Bank and undertaken by Robert Blackburn and Thomas Wainwright, this study examined how firms in Britain are responding to challenges in the economy and what their views and expectations are for 2011. Specific regions and sectors across Britain were studied to develop a large-scale picture of the recovery. The findings of this project were publicised widely in the media, including radio and
- The development of a measure of the innovative characteristics of young people. Led by Elizabeth Chell and involving Rosemary Athayde, this project builds on earlier work by further developing and testing the tool further, and establishing norms by age of student (ages 14–19 years).
- Global University Entrepreneurial Spirit Students'
 Survey (GUESSS). The SBRC is the UK partner of GUESSS, an international research project that investigates the entrepreneurial spirit/intentions of students worldwide. The project, involving around 30 universities and in collaboration with the University of St Gallen, Switzerland, investigates the effectiveness of universities' entrepreneurship programmes with national/international benchmarking. The SBRC is responsible for surveying students in the UK in spring 2011.
- The value of small company abbreviated accounts. This study was commissioned by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Scotland, and undertaken by John Kitching, Eva Kasperova and Robert Blackburn. Using interview and survey data from preparers of small company accounts and from a wide variety of account users, the study explores directors' motivations for filing abbreviated accounts and user motivations in the context of other sources of information they could use instead.
- SME capability to manage regulation: a literature review. This project builds on previous SBRC research on regulation and small business behaviour. Commissioned by the New Zealand government, it was undertaken by John Kitching and David Smallbone. The review formed the first stage of a large empirically based project in New Zealand.

External activities and appointments

Robert Blackburn performed numerous external roles including international plenary presentations at the 7th SMEs in a Global Economy conference in Sarawak, the Higher School of Economics, Moscow and the Business School at the University of Montpellier. Robert presented one of the first 'webinars' for the International Council for Small Business (ICSB) on Publishing in Journals, involving an interactive presentation with 40+ participants across the world. As Editor in Chief of the International Small Business Journal, Robert has worked with the editorial board to further strengthen the Journal's reputation. He examined PhDs at Aston, Royal Holloway, Strathclyde and Leeds Metropolitan universities. Robert also presented to the British Academy of Management's (BAM) Annual Doctoral Symposium at the University of Sheffield and the Association of Business Schools' / BAM's Director of Research Programme in London. Robert was elected to the Executive Board of the European Network for Social and Economic Research (www.ensr.eu/index.cfm). In December, Robert was appointed Chair of the international panel to evaluate the 3.5m Euro LIIKE2 research programme for the Academy of Finland.

In June 2010, **David Smallbone** became the President of the ICSB, which has led to visits to ICSB affiliates worldwide. He also sat on the appointment panel for a Professorship at the University of Aarhus, Denmark; was appointed to the Advisory Committee of the Entrepreneurship Development Programme at the Universidad Nacional de General Sarmiento, Argentina; and was a Distinguished Academic Visitor, Massey University, New Zealand. He examined PhDs in the universities of Edinburgh and North Staffordshire. He delivered invited keynote presentations in plenary sessions at conferences in Puerto Rico, South Korea, Russia, Bulgaria, New Zealand and China. The highlight was an invited keynote at the first international conference to be held in Soweto, South Africa. David has continued in the position of Associate Editor for the Journal of Small Business Management and co-chaired the 2010 ISBE Annual Research conference in London, with Robert Blackburn. He was also a member of the judging panel for British Chamber of Commerce Business of the Year Award.

Elizabeth Chell completed the NESTA-funded project to profile the innovative characteristics of young people, working with a software company to produce an online questionnaire that measures innovative characteristics of young people. She was guest editor (with Nicolopoulou K and Karatas-Ozkan M) for a special issue of Entrepreneurship and Regional Development on 'Social entrepreneurship: international and cross-cultural innovation'. Elizabeth also organised a workshop with Andrew Godley on social enterprise and business ethics, at Reading University.

John Kitching has reviewed research proposals for the ESRC; chaired the ISBE doctoral workshop; and reviewed papers for seven different journals on small business themes.

The Attitudes to Enterprise (ATE) Test developed by **Rosemary Athayde** to measure enterprise potential in young people has been successfully piloted in the Hangzhou Province in south-eastern China, by the Zhejiang University.

Mirela Xheneti presented a paper at the RENT XXIV conference: 'Research in entrepreneurship and small business', in Maastricht, Holland in November 2010.

New staff appointments

We are pleased to welcome the following members of staff to the SBRC:

Dr Thomas Wainwright joined the SBRC as a post-doctoral researcher in January 2010. His PhD (Nottingham University) examined the UK mortgage

market, wholesale banking, asset management and the unfolding of the credit crunch within the financial services sector.

Eva Kasperova also joined the SBRC in January 2010, as a research assistant. She is particularly interested in disability and entrepreneurship, and has recently embarked on a part-time PhD at Kingston.

Vik Gill joined the SBRC in August 2010 as an ESRC Management and Business Development Fellow pursuing a full-time PhD. Her research interests include social entrepreneurship, gender and entrepreneurship, and technology and innovation in SMEs.
